We had stories from far-flung places such as Japan, or were transported back in time to Ancient Greece and Ancient Egypt. The older children in Year 7 and 8 were treated to some spine-tinglingly tense tales set not so far away at all; I certainly won't be driving through Epping forest in the early hours of the morning, or looking to own a white sports car! This visit was fabulous and many children also went away with a signed copy of one or more of John's books, dedicated to them.

On our return from Boxmoor we checked out the newly cleaned stone pond and discovered frog spawn. It is wonderful that thanks to Eamon's massive effort to clean out the pond we are able to contribute to the local wildlife.



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DANCE WORKSHOP

This year our annual dance workshop with Stuart Bishop from the Pineapple Dance Studios was a great success and due to the overwhelming demand, we ran two workshops. All the children worked with great enthusiasm and interest, making so much effort to take part in the workshop. Naomi Bassett was selected by Stuart as the best dancer at the workshop because she really 'let her hair down'.

Once again, Year 4 embarked on their exciting day to Bhaktivedanta Manor, the Hare Krishna Temple donated by George Harrison. Fun was had by all in the form of bull-cart riding, face-painting, dressing up and touring the magnificent grounds. We learnt a huge amount about the various forms of Hindu worship, their beliefs and practices and how they live their daily lives at the manor. As usual, one of our favourite experiences was the tasty paneer curry, which everybody loved! 'My favourite part was the bull cart ride. The bulls were gigantic!' said Xavi Parmar.



"HANDS-ON" LEARNING IN YEAR 4



Our recent visit to a Sikh gurdwara enabled the children in Year 4 to see first-hand how Sikhs worship and live. We had a tour of the gurdwara by our favourite Sikh, Gurdeep. He explained how people of all faiths are welcome in a gurdwara. He showed us around the langar kitchen and we were even allowed to sample the delicious food (is there a recurring subject coming up here?). The children learned about the Sikh philosophy of everyone being equal and also about the origin of Sikhism. They also saw how much Sikhs do for their community. Our Ancient Egyptian history topic was brought to life when St Albans Museum came in to school to show us some artefacts from Ancient Egyptian times. The workshop began with group activities involving different aspects of Egyptian life. We dressed up as pharaohs, played with Egyptian toys and musical instruments and learned how to write our names in hieroglyphs! We also saw models of mummies and even had a go at bandaging ourselves up in linen. In the final, and most exciting part of the workshop, we were given the opportunity to look at some authentic Ancient Egyptian artefacts that had been excavated from the Valley of the Kings in the 1920's. There were shabti dolls, jewellery, and some amulets that had been found amongst the bandages of a real mummy!





SPRING CONCERT

At the end of last half term the music department put on a Spring Concert. However, the Choir got it right when they sang, '*I Can See Clearly Now The Snow Has Come'*. From among our instrumentalists, we had guitarists, pianists, trumpeters and one saxophonist, of which the last three all had an ABRSM Grade 4 soloist performing. We had some beginner guitarists as well with Ben Fuller wowing the girls with his now WBH-famous electric guitar rendition of yet another Beatles song. We had beginner singers like Toby Daghlian bravely getting up on stage, all the way up to Grade 4 songs. ABRSM EXAMINATIONS

We are now holding ABRSM exams every term. Last Friday 16th March, we had another 17 children from WBH entered, who were examined by an external examiner. Last term's results included three Distinctions, one of which was Charlie Burgar attaining an amazing 136 points for her Grade 3 ABRSM Singing exam. These exam certificates are recognized worldwide and at Grade 5 level, also by Universities.
