## Sikh Temple

Our recent visit to a Sikh Gurdwara enabled the children in Year 4 to see first-hand how Sikhs worship. The children learned how people of all faiths are welcome in a Gurdwara, about the Sikh philosophy of everyone being equal and also, the origin of Sikhism. They also saw how much Sikhs do for their community. At the end of their visit, the children went into the Langar, where they were invited to share in a vegetarian snack, a very important custom in Sikhism.



Our Ancient Egyptian history topic was brought to life when St Albans Museum came into school to show us some artefacts from ancient Egyptian times. The workshop began with group activities, involving different aspects of Egyptian life. The children dressed up as Egyptians, played with Egyptian toys and musical instruments and learned how to write their names in hieroglyphics! They also saw models of mummies and even had a turn at bandaging themselves up in linen strips. In the final and most exciting part of the workshop, the children were given the opportunity to look at and handle some authentic ancient Egyptian artefacts that had been excavated from the Valley of the Kings in the 1920s. There were shabti dolls, jewellery, and some amulets that had been found amongst the bandages of a real mummy!









## Year 6 Synagogue Trip

On Wednesday 22<sup>nd</sup> February Year 6 were taken by Mrs Brown, Mr James and Mr Woodward to the St Albans Masorti Synagogue, as part of their Religious Studies. This trip enabled the children to gain a better understanding of the importance of the Synagogue to those of the Jewish faith, together with what can be seen inside.

Year 6 were conducted around a wonderful display that explained who Jewish people are (including many famous celebrities who are Jewish), the Torah (the Jewish Law), the differences between egalitarian, reform and traditional (orthodox) synagogues, the Jewish calendar, and special Jewish celebrations like Pesach (Passover), Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Shavuot and Sukkot. The children were also able to enact a Shabbat meal, learn the differences between Kosher and non-Kosher foods, and the rituals that take place during various stages in Jewish life, from the birth of a baby to Bat and Bar Mitzvah, marriage and the end of life.

Year 6 also learnt about the Rabbi's role as the leader of that local Jewish community and what happened during the services he or she conducts. They saw the beautifully designed menorah (the seven-branched candlestick and symbol of Judaism) the bimah (reading desk) and the ner tamid (the everlasting light) that symbolises God's eternal presence.

One of the scrolls was then taken from the Ark (which represents the original Ark of the Covenant that contained the Ten Commandments) and the children were able to see the hand-written Hebrew script of the Torah. They learnt that each scroll cost around £30,000 and was treated with great respect; wrapped in mantles, read with a silver

pointer (yad) to avoid damage, and buried when no longer legible.

The children clearly had a most enjoyable and memorable time and the handson experience really brought to life the children's classroom learning. A big 'thank you' to all at the Synagogue for a wonderful morning.





# Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time

The adaptation of Mark Haddon's 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time' absolutely captivated the pupils and staff lucky enough to attend and we could, from the very first scene, see why it was hailed by The Times as 'a phenomenal combination of storytelling and spectacle.' It opened with Christopher, fifteen years old, stood beside Mrs Shears' dead dog. It had been speared with a garden fork seven minutes after midnight, and Christopher was under suspicion... We were subsequently taken on a journey through Christopher's extraordinary brain, seeing that whilst he was exceptional at maths, he was ill-equipped to interpret everyday life; a life that also became destabilised by events beyond his control.

The production has since provoked some very interesting and thoughtful work in English lessons and PSHCEE.

Victor, Year 7 said:

'Christopher had a different way of viewing the world to most people. Although the author of the book doesn't say it, I think that Christopher is autistic, which means he takes things very literally. The play showed me that he

was very clever and could answer any maths sum perfectly, but he found it very hard to be touched or to read people's expressions.... I really enjoyed the play because it gave really good insight of what it must be like to have a disability or be so different. The story was thrilling, but also touching because of how hard it must be not just for Christopher, but also his parents.'







## Safety Awareness Centre

As part of our PSHCEE curriculum, which includes focus on fundamental British values (FBV) and the spiritual, moral, social and cultural (SMSC) development of pupils, we visited The Safety Centre in Kiln Farm with Year 6. The children took part in twelve different activities within the centre, designed to give them a unique and interactive learning experience.

During their tour of this incredible 'life -size' village, pupils encountered a range of 'hazards' giving them the opportunity to develop vital knowledge and strategies on how to stay safe and how to avoid behaviour that could lead to dangerous, anti-social or illegal acts.







#### Dissection

Year 7 were able to dissect a pig's heart. When we cut the heart open, there was quite a lot of squeaking from some of the boys. We saw some of the cords, blood vessels, trachea and the general structure of the heart.

For the finale, Mrs Harris took the liver that she had and we tested to see the effect that alcohol had on it. The liver reacted quickly and we had a good idea of what an alcoholic's liver would look like.

We all learnt loads from the dissection, and it was a perfect way to end our topic of the circulatory system'.

Ben (Year 7) enjoyed his dissection and wrote in his review:

'I found out what a pig looks like inside and pigs are very like us and their heart is the same size. Cilia cells keep our lungs and trachea clean, and you kill them smoking. The trachea that is completely clean belongs to a free range pig. The free range pig we saw had no dust in its trachea'. Elliot agreed with Ben adding:

'If a pig is brought up on a dusty barn, its trachea is dirty and could have easily got clogged. When a pig is brought up in the wild, it has a trachea which is clear and isn't clogged. It shows that even if a pig is brought up with plenty of food and water on a dusty farm, its trachea could be dirtier than a free range pig which did not have as much food or water as it needed. It may sound false but it is true, and it shows how careful you have to be bringing an animal up on a farm'.

## Year 7 Science Activity





## Holocaust Memorial Day

On Friday 27<sup>th</sup> January we celebrated Holocaust Memorial Day. We started our day with a morning assembly, introducing the theme, 'Rescuers.'

Throughout the day the children took part in various activities, learning about important individuals, many of whom were responsible for rescuing others. At break time, everyone including Lower School enjoyed a tasty slice of Jewish Challah bread.

In the afternoon Upper School watched a recorded version of the Antiques Road Show which was dedicated to Holocaust memorabilia, and it was very moving to listen to the accounts of those who survived the Holocaust, of their ordeals during World War II, and of the loved ones whom they lost. Freddie (Year 7) and several of his friends prepared and delivered a presentation all about Freddie's Great Grandfather who survived the Holocaust, which was excellent and very poignant.

The day was completed with a special Holocaust Memorial Evensong, with all the hymns, songs, poetry and readings dedicated to those who endured the Holocaust. Throughout the day the children were really interested, considerate and thoughtful and they learnt a great deal.

## Natural History Museum

On 3rd March Year 6 went on the Natural History Museum trip for their earthquakes and volcanoes topic, as well as their science investigative sessions. We had seamless journeys to and from London.

We arrived there just after 10:30 and, after registration and briefing, the pupils were divided into two groups, group A doing the investigative session, whilst group B went to the Red Zone to do their discovery session on volcanoes and earthquakes.

Finally, we met up at 14:30 for a quick shopping spree as the pupils spent their pocket money on souvenirs.




snow on day three. This made skiing on our final two days an absolute dream!

#### **Watford Festival**


The Watford Festival was held at Parmiters school over several weekends.
