A proud team received their runners up medals on the pavilion steps and David Burnell was awarded the Batsman of the Tournament trophy. 


SWALLOWS AT TRING MUSEUM

If the children are really quiet, they may be lucky enough to spot rabbits, squirrels and foxes and even the possibility of an early evening badger, muntjac deer, wood mouse or field vole. Using

their field books to help with identification, and the expertise of Mrs Hauser and Mrs Harris, the children recorded the wildlife as we walked, taking photos and learning much about the natural phenomena that is on our doorstep, and why conservation is so important. This time the children were able to record up to 90 different species. Charlotte Payne, Zoe Jones, Alice Ripper and Sophie Gasser spotted the most for the girls and Daniel Morrissey, Ethan Stockbridge, Toby Ogelman and Reuben Stoner-Redfern recorded most for the boys, and all agreed the ramble was a great way to spend a lovely summer's evening. 

A LAW UNTO THEMSELVES

Not, we hope, in preparation for a future life of crime, Year 8 are visited each year by a local Magistrate upon their return from PGL. This year was no exception and on Tuesday 18th June Mr. Nicholas Crispin came to school to show the children what goes on in the Magistrate's Courts. Being a small class this year, Year 8 were joined by Year 6 girls and Mr Crispin 'held court' in the Assembly Hall and showed the children the difference between youth courts (who deal with children between 10 and 18 years old) and normal courts, for adults of 19 years and over. The youth courts are a little more 'friendly' and conversations take place between the Magistrates and the children who are 'up before them'. Those children's parents can also be present. Our children were able to role play, acting as different

members of the court or as victims or perpetrators of crime, while Mr. Crispin explained their roles, especially those of the Magistrate's. During one scene, Aidan Mullins played an assaulted victim, Lara Mills was the prosecuting lawyer, Ben Yeo the suspect and Edward Khan the defence lawyer, while Kolade Ladipo, Paige Atkinson and Alice Ripper represented the Board of Magistrates. Luckily for Aidan (and unluckily for Ben) the 'court', after hearing from 'witnesses' and both the defence and prosecuting counsels, found in the victim's favour! Everyone enjoyed the occasion and learnt a great deal which will stand them in good stead. We're very grateful to Mr Crispin for giving up his time to visit us again, and Ben can thank his lucky stars we're not still living in the Medieval realms!

On Monday 29th April Year 6 were taken on an inspiring visit around the lovely Church of St John's (where we hold our Christmas Carol Services) by Mrs Carol Lewis, a parishioner and friend of Rev James Reveley, who has now moved to Peterborough. This church, dedicated to St John the Evangelist, is a lovely example of a fairly modern C of E church. The children were made to feel very welcome by Mrs Lewis, who explained the church's history and all the wonderful things that can be found in it, and what they mean and represent. The children learnt about St John and how aspects of his life are captured in the church's beautiful stained-glass windows, and they enjoyed the cool, tranquil atmosphere as they explored the various parts of the building – the nave, chancel, font, altar, side-chapel, pulpit etc and took notes on everything, including the tabernacle, lectern and new organ, to follow up with a mini-project on their return to school. 
